Village President Linda Jackson and Board of Trustees,

The Glendale Heights Police Department had a busy year in 2007, through it all, the men and women of the Department continued to exhibit the professionalism that we have come to expect from members of the Glendale Heights Police Department.

Challenges

Manpower shortages continued throughout 2007 as they did the previous year. In May of 2006, the Village Board authorized an increase in strength of the Police Department to 55 sworn members. The Department was finally able to fill the last available position in June of 2007 and that officer was fully trained and began filling a schedule position in December of 2007. The Department, again in 2007, operated short of our authorized strength for the majority of the year. Despite having all slots filled, the schedule suffered due to injuries and Family and Medical Leaves (FMLA). August was our worse month with 6 officers off on FMLA leave or on light duty due to work related injuries. Service to the residents did not suffer as the Department utilized overtime to hire back officers to maintain minimum staffing. As 2007 ended, only 2 officers were unable to work due to injury or illness.

In December of 2006 the Police Commission began the testing process again as we had exhausted the eligibility list that had been created in December of 2005. We had a successful recruitment drive resulting in 93 candidates submitting applications. The Department's efforts were successful in recruiting a diversified candidate pool, which reflects the Village's demographics, to the testing process. The testing process was completed in January of 2007 and an initial eligibility list of 38 candidates was created. As of the end of 2007, only 9 eligible candidates remain on the list. We have hired 3 officers from this eligibility list; two replacements and one new officer.

The CALEA project continued to move forward in 2007 with a mock assessment of our preparedness for the anticipated on-site assessment by CALEA assessors in 2008. We were slightly disappointed in the outcome of the mock assessment which provided us with valuable feedback in preparing for the on-site assessment. The feedback received is being utilized to make the corrections necessary to ensure accreditation in 2008 as scheduled.

The new Records Management System provided by DuPage County continues to be somewhat of a challenge. The Emergency Telephone and Services Board (ETSB) along with Motorola continue to work on the issues that have presented themselves. Some error messages have been difficult to work around, and retrieving crime data from the system continues to have flaws.

Community Involvement

In 2007, the Police Department continued to participate and facilitate events that reach out to the public to foster community involvement with the Department. School Resource Officers conducted 261 D.A.R.E. classes and 285 G.R.E.A.T. classes in our schools. The Department also ran five, week long, Safety Town classes. In addition, members of the Department conducted the 3rd annual Jr. Police Academy, designed for 5th through 8th graders. Students are exposed to a variety of police training that includes, testing to be a police officer, evidence work, and making traffic stops.

The Department continues to stay in touch with the community through the Neighborhood Watch program. Meetings are held on the 4th Wednesday of every month in the Council Chambers. Attendees are shown a presentation which includes a synopsis of crimes that occurred during the past month and are treated to guest speakers. Through Neighborhood Watch meetings trouble spots in the Village come to light.

In April the Department sponsored an alcohol awareness night for teenagers. This program included victim impact presentations from the Alliance Against Intoxicated Motorists (AAIM) as well as other guest speakers. Door prizes of free prom tickets were donated by the three Glenbard Schools that our residents attend as an incentive to have as many teens attend as possible. The program took place during Alcohol Awareness month and right in time for the prom season.

Members of the Police Department attended the numerous park parties and many neighborhood block parties during the year. In August, the Department threw the largest block party of the year next to the Sports Hub in honor of National Night Out. Free hamburgers, hot dogs and beverages were distributed to those residents attending. There were booths with information to increase awareness of crime, McGruff the crime dog made an appearance, the Illinois Treasurer's office set up shop to help residents check unclaimed funds for their own names and the Glenside Fire Department brought some of their apparatus for display. The event was attended by over 300 residents.

The return of the Citizens Police Academy was extremely successful. The program began in January of 2007 and 25 residents graduated at a banquet in

their honor in April. The response for the program was impressive and a number of those graduating have now become involved as volunteers for the Emergency Services and Disaster Agency (ESDA). The program will continue in 2008 picking up those who were on the waiting list from 2007 and more interested residents.

The Police Department continues to take advantage of the Village's web site and the skills of the Public Relations Department to better communicate with the public. Crime alerts are posted and press releases are available on the Police Department's site. We have posted the annual report on the site to continue to inform residents of what is occurring in their community. We have found this to be a valuable tool in working in partnership with the community.

Crime

Part 1 crimes are those that are most serious in nature and include Burglary, Theft and Aggravated Assault and Battery. There was a 7.7% reduction in the number of reported Part 1 crimes between 2006 and 2007. The 727 Part 1 crimes reported was the lowest since 2000 when 716 were reported. The largest reductions were in the categories of motor vehicle theft and burglary. Of the 727 reported, 17.3% were cleared by arrest, as opposed to 15.2% of Part 1 crimes cleared by arrest in 2006.

The less serious, but equally important, Part II crimes, increased by 14.2% this year as compared to last. Part II crimes include Criminal Damage to Property, Deceptive Practice, Forgery, Liquor Law Violations, Identity Theft, Internet Crime and most Class A Misdemeanor Traffic Offenses. The clearance rate for Part II crimes in 2007 was 36.7% compared with 44.9% in 2006 and 33.7% in 2005.

Despite the overall increase in index crimes, total calls for service, including calls such as domestic disturbances, suspicious persons, vehicle lockouts, loud music and barking dog complaints as well as the index crimes decreased by 5.5% in 2007. The number of arrests made by officers increased by 8.4% which includes a 29.3% increase in the number of felony arrests made. This indicates a shift, at least this year, in the seriousness of calls to Police; more arrests and fewer service calls also require more man-hours.

Major investigations in 2007 included:

- **Attempt Murder/Aggravated Discharge of a Firearm.** On July 14, 2007, at approximately 10:30 PM, the Glendale Heights Police Department received numerous 911 calls of a shooting in the area of Armitage Avenue and Bloomingdale Road. Upon arrival officers located the 28 year old victim, who was from Bolingbrook, laying on the sidewalk on the north side of Armitage between Bloomingdale Road and Chapman Court. The victim had received a single gunshot wound to the chin.

Glenside paramedics responded to the scene and transported the victim to Glen Oaks Hospital where he was treated and subsequently airlifted to Loyola Medical Center in Maywood.

We are still looking for the two suspects:

Suspect #1: M/W or light skinned M/H, 20 -25, approx. 5'9", thin build with dark hair. This subject was wearing a white baseball hat and a white athletic jersey at the time of the shooting

Subject #2: Dark-skinned M/H, 17-18. This subject was wearing a dark colored "skull-cap", dark shirt and dark shorts at the time of the shooting.

Both suspects are believed to be gang members and were last seen running W/B from the scene. Prior to the shooting, a dark colored (possibly green) mid-sized vehicle reportedly drove by the victim very slowly W/B on Armitage while he was standing in the 7-11 parking lot. It is unknown if this vehicle was involved. Despite numerous interviews and pursuing many investigative leads, this case remains open.

- **Attempt Murder/Aggravated Discharge of a Firearm.** On August 26, 2007 at approximately 6:00 PM, an individual from Elgin went to 493 Gregory with a duffel bag containing over \$12,000.00 for reasons that were not stated. When he arrived he was met by two (2) M/B subjects in the first floor hall. One of the subjects shot the victim. The victim and suspects then fled from the building. The victim was treated and released at Alexian Brothers Hospital for a minor gunshot wound to the chest. During an interview following the incident, the victim reported that he won the \$12,000 gambling and went to the apartment with two relatives, also of Elgin. The victim could not supply a plausible explanation for why he was bringing the money to the apartment, nor could/would he provide further information as to the identity of his relative.

The victim has retained an attorney and refuses to speak with detectives. The cash was seized and has since been awarded to the Police Department as proceeds from illegal activity.

Suspect(s) –

- 1) M/B, 25, 508/160 wearing a white t-shirt and black pants
- 2) M/B – no further description
- 3) M/B – no further description

Suspect Vehicle –

Beige or gold colored vehicle, possibly a 1989-90 Grand Prix. Passenger side is damaged as though it had been in an accident. First three numbers on the registration are believed to be 8-3-5.

This case remains open and investigators are still pursuing leads.

- **Armed Robbery.** On October 5, 2007 at approximately 5:25 PM, a Glendale Heights Police officer was flagged down in the parking lot of 557 Gregory by a subject claiming he had been robbed at knifepoint by a subject who forced his way into his apartment. The suspect was seen leaving the area and the victim pointed the suspect out to the officer. The officer attempted to stop the individual and a short vehicle pursuit ensued. The suspect was eventually apprehended on Applewood Drive in Bloomingdale. Ja Emm Williams, 25 of Bloomingdale, was charged with Robbery, Possession of Cannabis and a variety of traffic related offenses.

- **First Degree Murder.** On November 18, 2007 at approximately 8:42 PM, we were summoned to 1860 Harvest at the request of Hanover Park Police Department as they were with a subject that was reporting he had set fire to his home. The investigation revealed that this subject, later identified as Kuashik Patel, of 1860 Harvest had allegedly set fire to his 4 and 7 year old sons and to himself. He left the residence after the fire extinguished itself and drove to his brother's home in Hanover Park with his sons. All three were eventually transported to Loyola Medical Center's Burn Unit. Both boys have since died from the injuries sustained in the fire, the 4 year old died in January of 2008 and the 7 year old died in February. Kuashik Patel has been charged with murder in connection with the death of his two sons and is currently in custody at the DuPage County Jail.
- **First Degree Murder.** On December 19, 2007, at approximately 3:04 AM, the Glendale Heights Police Department was called to a report of a man down on the sidewalk near the intersection of Pleasant and James Ct. Officers responded and found a male subject lying on the sidewalk with his dog sitting next to him. The 35 year old male subject later identified as Corey D. Krueger, a resident of Glendale Heights, was unresponsive with a gun shot wound to his head. Mr. Krueger was transported by the Glenside Fire District paramedics to Good Samaritan Hospital in Downers Grove for treatment where he died from his injuries.

Shortly before receiving the report of the man down, Glendale Heights Police had made a traffic stop on a vehicle, a 1991 4 dr. Honda Accord, in the vicinity. Two of the occupants of the vehicle fled on foot immediately upon the car stopping and two remained with the vehicle.

Through the course of the investigation, sufficient evidence was gathered to implicate one of the occupants of the Honda, Isaias Beltran, 19, of 547 Lynn Ct., Glendale Heights in the murder of Corey Krueger. Mr. Beltran was charged with two counts of First Degree Murder and was taken to the DuPage County Jail. It is alleged that this murder took place during the course of a robbery. There is no indication that Beltran knew Mr. Krueger.

Traffic

There was a 6.5% increase in the number of traffic stops made by the Department and 6.7% fewer traffic tickets issued compared with 2006, the number of DUI arrests were down 5.6% and class A misdemeanor traffic arrests were up by 1.8%. Class A misdemeanor arrests are for No Valid Driver's License and Driving with a Suspended or Revoked Driver's License.

There was a small increase in the number of traffic accidents in 2007; 2.9%, however there were 28.5% fewer accidents involving injuries, and no fatal accidents. The intersection of Glen Ellyn Road and North Avenue remains the location of the most traffic accidents in the Village. The Department will be identifying methods to decrease the number of accidents at the 5 top accident intersections

Training

The Glendale Heights Police Department continues to make training its officers a top priority. Police Officers are given the authority by law to take a person's freedom away and in extreme cases are authorized to take a life if necessary. No other profession has the power afforded to the Police. It is important that Police Officers are consistently trained and kept up to date on new laws and techniques and are refreshed on skills not used often but that are necessary. To continue the training process the Department established a training committee within the Department to identify training needs and curriculum that will keep officers fully trained professionals. The Training Committee is working toward developing training tracks and career development training that will benefit every member of the Department. In 2007 over 4,000 hours were spent in some form of training, which ranged from Basic Academy Training, Management Training, language, Defensive Tactics, tactical response, NIMS training, traffic and DUI enforcement and new laws, policies and procedures training, among other topics.

Use of Force

In 2007 the Glendale Heights Police Department had 39 use of force incidents out of the 22,453 incidents handled or in .17% of all incidents handled. In 2006 force was used in .09% of incidents handled. As stated earlier, the number of arrests made by officers increased by 8.4% which includes a 29.3% increase in the number of felony arrests; more arrests provide additional circumstances where force may be required. These 39 incidents covered the use of force on 51 different individuals. Of the 51 subjects that force was used on, 12 reported receiving injuries, 4 of those were treated and released from Glen Oaks Hospital for minor claims of injuries. One subject was transported to the hospital due to emotional problems; this person was hospitalized and not charged with a crime. A total of 3 police officers were injured as a result of these incidents. One of those injured required surgery to repair his knee. There were no complaints of excessive force being used and all force was deemed justified through the Department's review process. Each use of force is reviewed by the immediate supervisor and then by a Use of Force Review Board to determine whether or not the force used was objectively reasonable, complied with State Law and Department Policy.

Traffic Stop Statistical Study

The State of Illinois is in the fourth year of collecting data on traffic stops made by police officers throughout the State. The data is analyzed each year by the Northwestern University Center for Public Safety to determine if minority drivers are being stopped at a higher rate than white drivers. Our 2007 data indicates that white drivers in Glendale Heights account for 61.1% of all traffic stops and represent 58.9% of the driving population. These percentages indicate that white drivers are overrepresented in our stops in proportion to their driving population.

Therefore non-white drivers are underrepresented. This study is becoming less valid the later in the decade we get, as the driving population figures are still based on the 2000 census. The Glendale Heights Police Department has a strict policy which prohibits racial profiling on traffic stops and all racially biased policing. This data shows that policy is being adhered to.

Grants

The Glendale Heights Police Department was the recipient of 4 separate grants totaling \$74,091. Each of these grants are reimbursement grants which means the funds must be expended before the grant money is released to the Department. The grants received are:

- Illinois Department of Transportation DUI MAP Grant which, reimburses overtime for officers dedicated to DUI enforcement.
- Department of Justice G.R.E.A.T. Grant reimburses funds utilized to continue the G.R.E.A.T. program in Glendale Heights. Expenses reimbursed include promotional items, conference expenses and salaries.
- State of Illinois Tobacco Grant, which reimburses expenses in the enforcement of retail sale of tobacco products to minor laws.
- TARGET Community Assistance grant which purchased a laptop computer to use during internet sting operations.

The charts and graphs that follow were prepared by Office Technician Maureen Pope and compare this year's statistics to the previous four years. 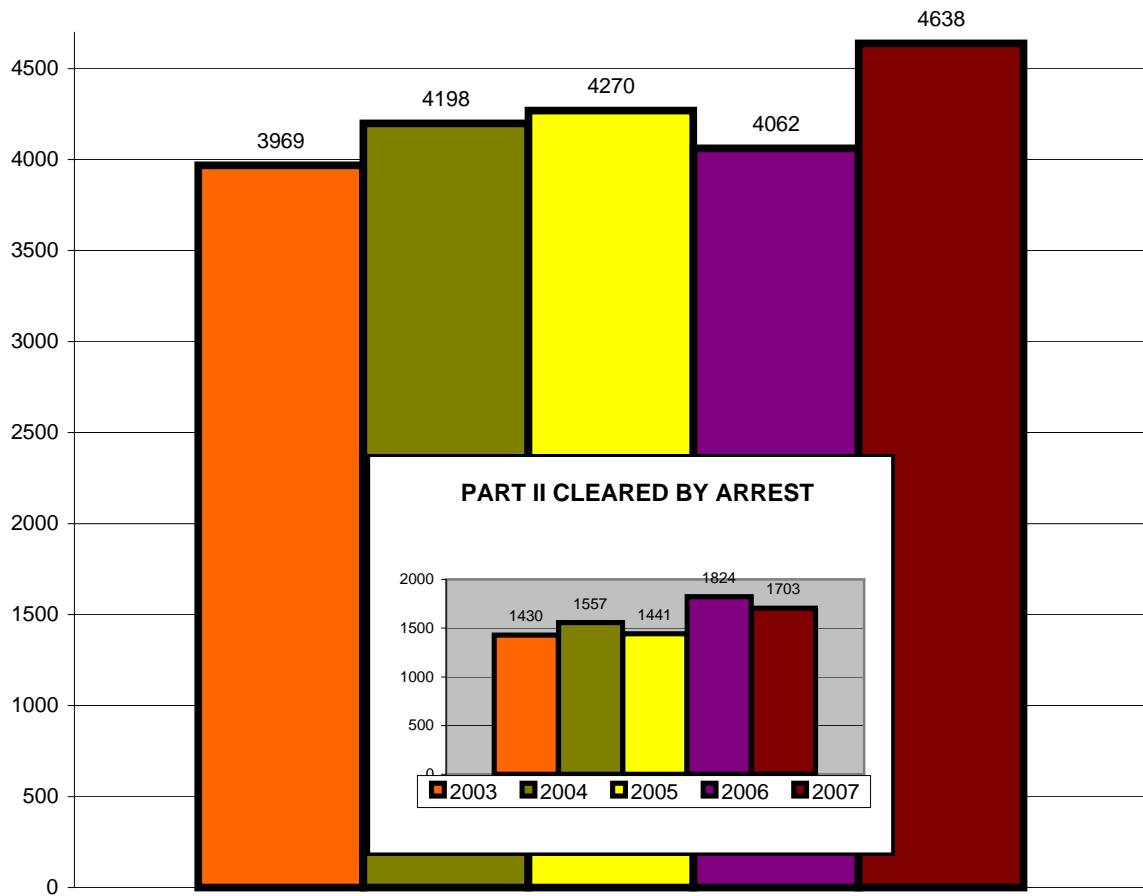

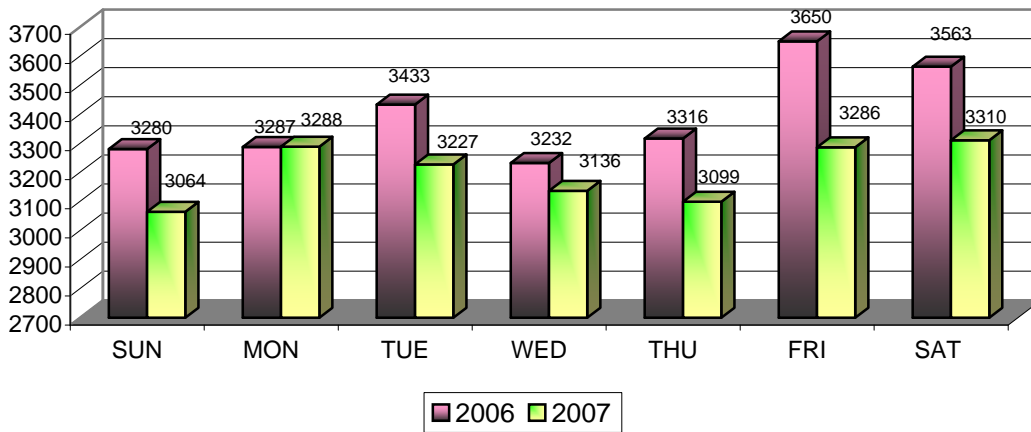
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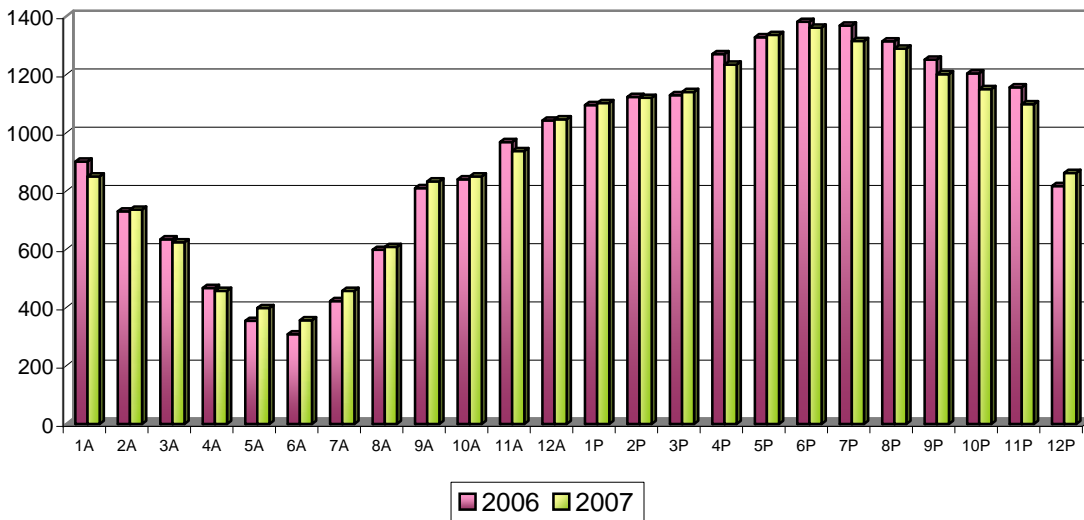
Calls for Service Summary



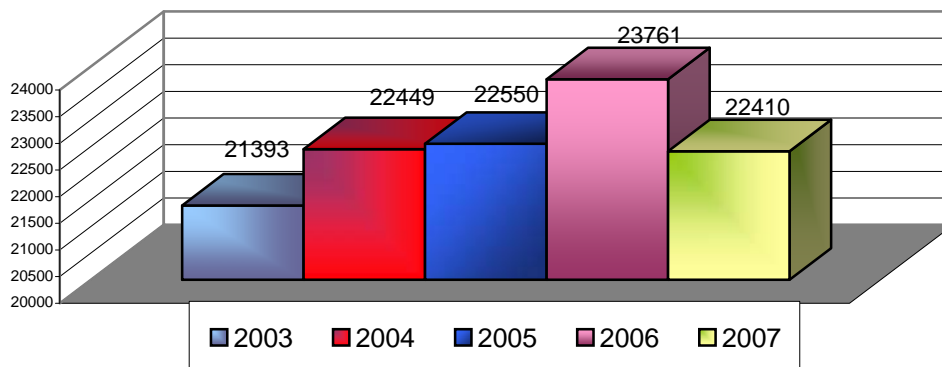
CALLS FOR SERVICE BY DAY

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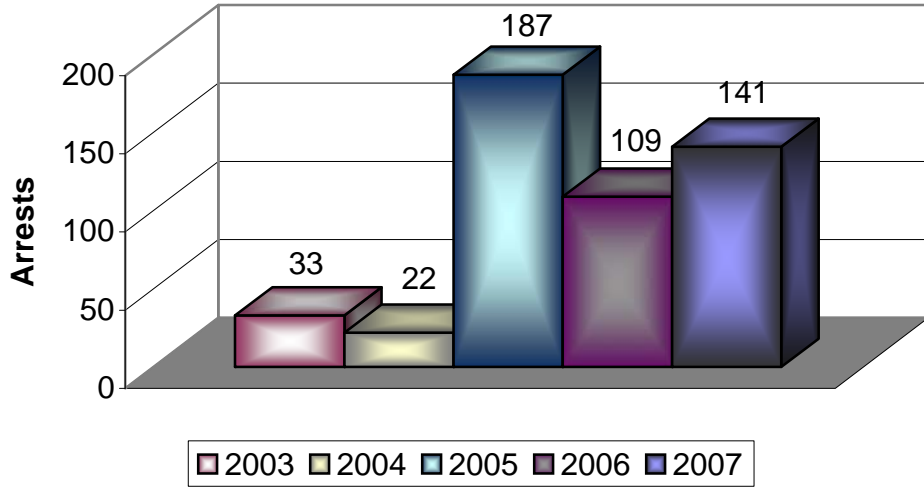

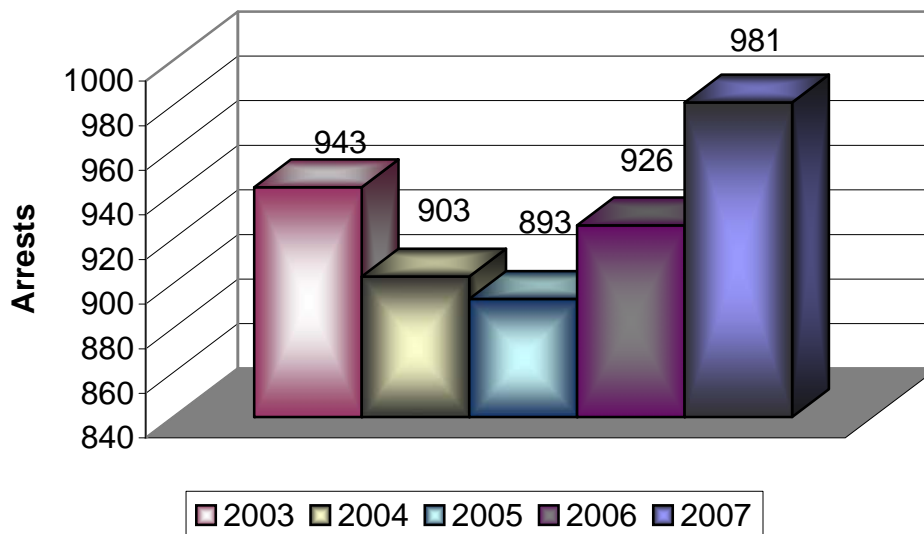


5 Year Comparison

2007 Felony Arrests

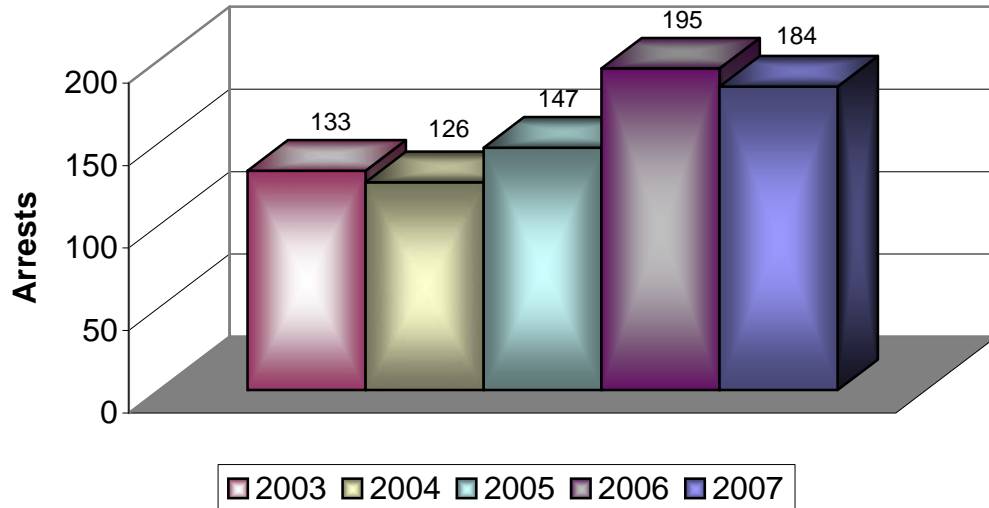


2007 Misdemeanor Arrests

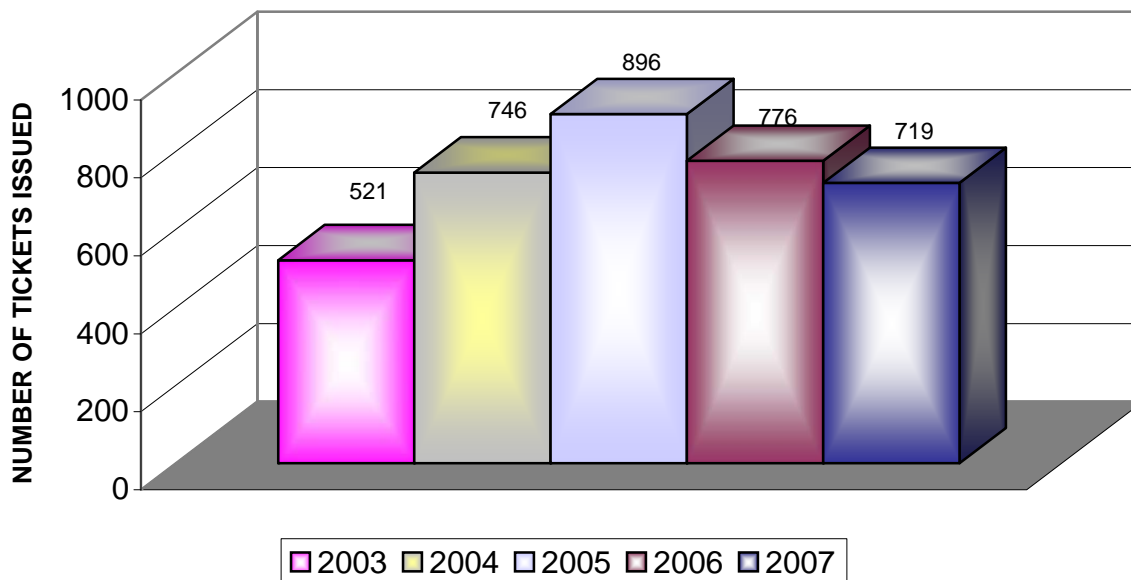

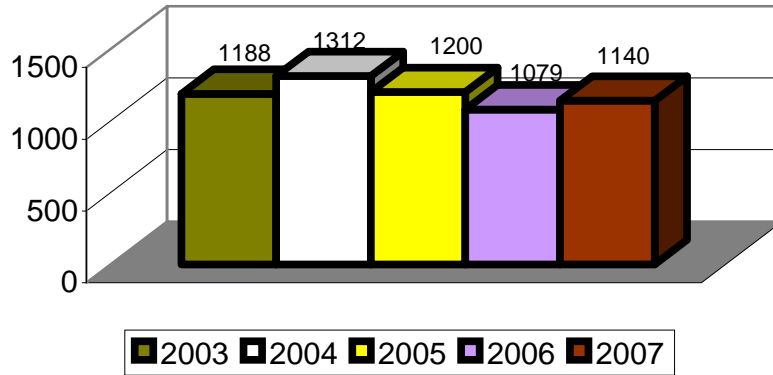


Top 6 Intersections Involving Accidents 2007

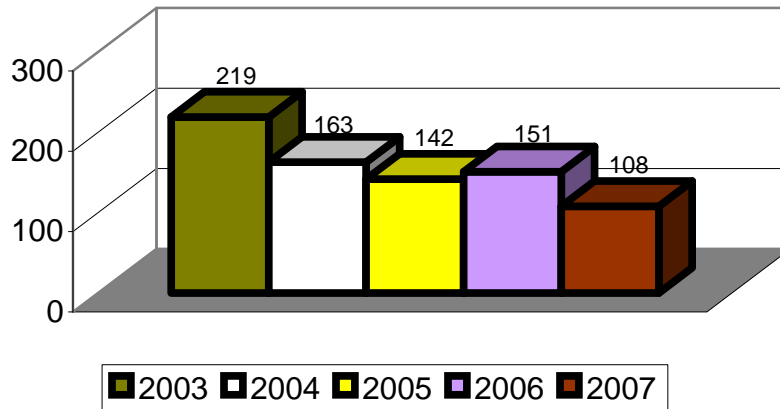

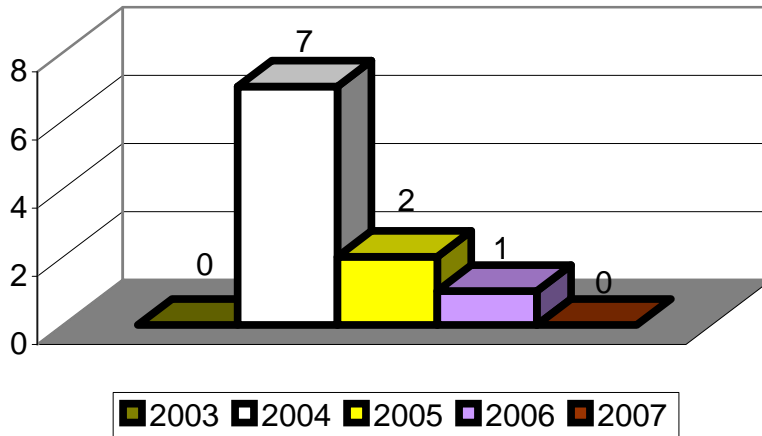
PROPERTY DAMAGE ACCIDENTS



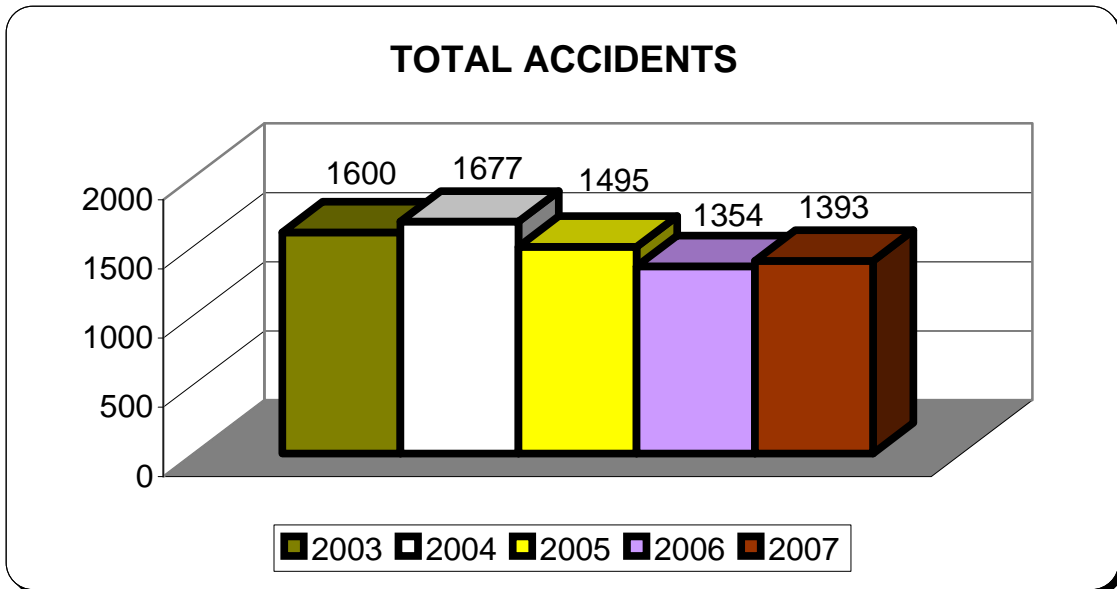
INJURY ACCIDENTS



FATAL ACCIDENTS



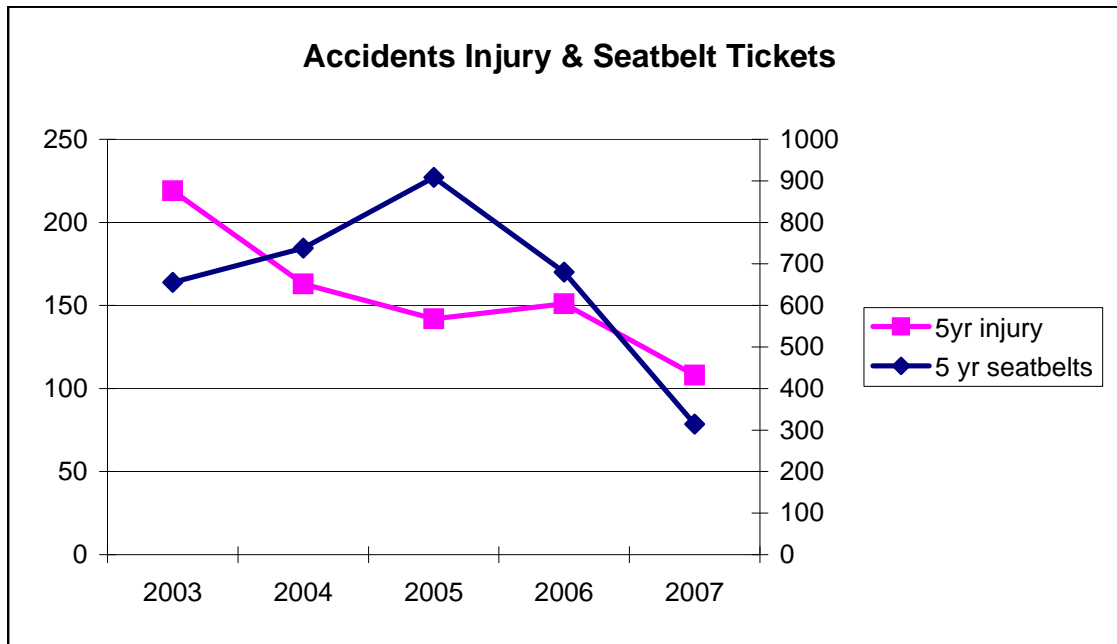
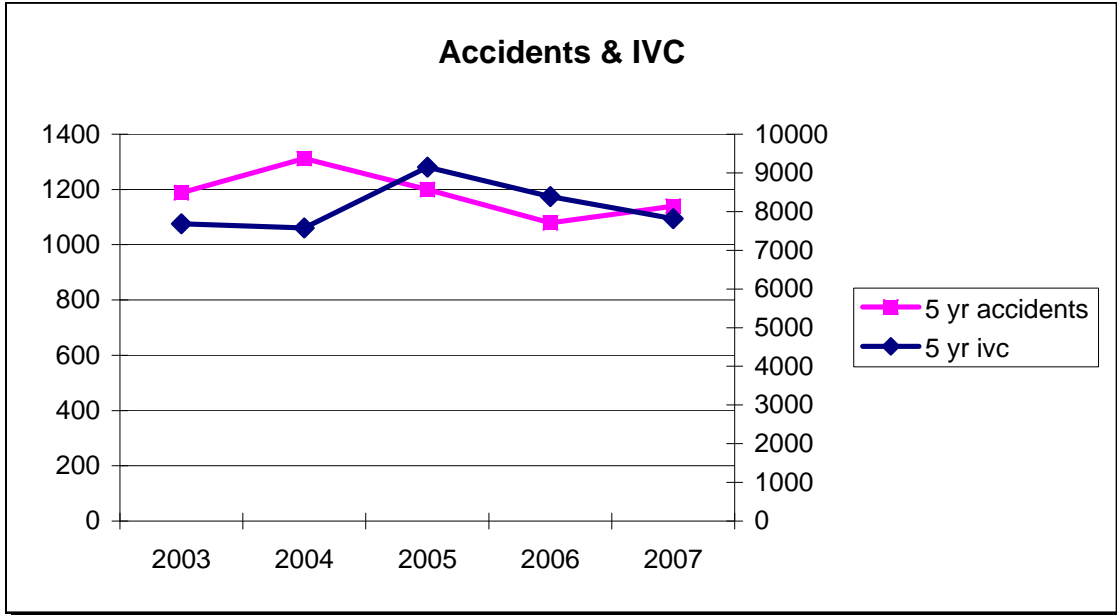
